Message from the Principal

Dear Families,

It has been a very exciting week here at Kew Primary School with the students involved in a range of engaging and exciting activities. Our staff endeavor to keep families informed of what is happening in the classroom and specialist programs each week through the weekly overview sent out on Compass at the start of each week. In addition, the KPS team is always happy to schedule a time on the phone, online or in person to discuss learning and wellbeing matters with you.

At Kew Primary School we love to talk about learning and teaching and an area of the Victorian Curriculum that we spend a lot of time focusing on is numeracy. Today we had a wonderful day exploring mathematics concepts with our Kew Maths Quest taking place. Please make sure you speak to your child about the types of activities they participated in. Developing strong numeracy skills helps our learners to:

- understand and use numbers and other mathematical ideas in everyday life
- recognise and use shape
- work out the chance of something happening
- understand the data we see in the media.

Numeracy is necessary for everyday living. From daily activities like telling the time, cooking and setting the table to more difficult tasks such as understanding mobile phone plans, planning a trip, reading a map and understanding timetables. As children and young people move through life stages the everyday numeracy demands become more complex. Employers see numeracy as important in the workplace. Research shows that higher numeracy skills lead to higher levels of health and wellbeing and other benefits such as better decision making and financial independence. The Victorian Department of Education website www.vic.gov.gu/mathematics-and-numeracyhome#resources-for-parents from which some of the information is gathered also provides families with a whole lot of resources that you can use to help and support your children as they continue to develop and grow in the numeracy space.

Protecting the safety and well-being of children through the reporting and monitoring of absenteeism is the responsibility of both parents/carers and schools. Please remember to log your child's absence using COMPASS early in the morning if your child is going to be away or late for school so your child's absence can be recorded correctly. For further information on the processes and procedures our school uses to record, monitor and follow-up student attendance and absence please read our Attendance Policy by logging into COMPASS and then proceed to the school documentation tab in Community and then the document can then be accessed from the drop-down policy menu.

There are times when we will need to contact you, including on the day if your child is absent and you haven't informed the school as to why. Do we have your most up to date contact details? Please include parent/carers' name, address, phone numbers, email address and emergency contact details. Please remember to contact the school if any of these details or your circumstances change.

OUR SPECIALISTS' PROGRAM

There is nothing that gives me more pleasure than watching the students engaged in their learning and having those "aha" moments. At Kew Primary School, teams plan together to develop targeted engaging activities for all students. This week, I visited the specialist classes to see them in action and watch the students become creative. Our specialist team plans together even though the curriculum area they each teach is very different.

On Monday, we held our annual House Cross Country event at Hays Paddock for our years three to six students. We were very impressed with how they displayed many of our school's CARE values, particularly Achievement and Resilience. Every student in year 3 – 6 participated, tried their best and crossed the finish line, whether they were racing for first place, striving for a personal best or supporting their peers to finish the run. I love this quote by Usaine Bolt: "I don't compare myself to anyone. I don't think I'm anywhere near finished." I have always told my own children to try their personal best rather than compete against others.

In the afternoon, our Prep – year 2 students participated in a rotation of activities such as an obstacle course, the noodle race etc. where they could show case their skills. I was very impressed with our young participants showing their cooperation skills. I would like to thank our year six Physical Action Team and students from 4AB for supporting and encouraging our prep – year 2 students for enthusiastically trying their best.

I would like to thank our PE teacher Scott Behm for putting these two events on. There is an enormous amount of organisation that takes place in the background that might not be as evident to families. Thank you to the parents/carers who helped on the day as events like these can't go on if we don't have enough helpers.

We have a dedicated specialist team providing students with engaging activities to cater for various interests. I visited Carla Temple in the art room during my Learning Walks and asked the students what they were learning about and why. They were able to explain the lesson, how they knew they were successful and where to go for help if needed. Every term, I rotate the students' artwork in my office. The work they produce in the art room is of such high calibre that I often get asked where I have purchased the artwork from.



The French room was buzzing with French words this week for Mother's Day or special person's day. Diana Caillier has been providing the students with the French vocabulary so that they could write a message for a special person in their life. I don't want to spoil the surprise but some lovely messages are coming your way.





I visited the Prue Boulter in the Performing Arts room and watched the children work in groups to develop a story which they will use to create a stop motion. The students were so engaged in the task that they did not even hear me walk into the room.

I would like to thank our specialist teachers for constantly looking for innovative ways to engage the students to cover their curriculum areas. It can be tricky being specialist teachers when they only see the students once a week to cover everything that they need to teach. Their professionalism and dedication are much appreciated.
